Psalm for the day: At the end of the psalm we say

Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; as it was in the beginning is now and shall be for ever. Amen.

Canticle

Who is this that comes from Edom, ♦ coming from Bozrah, his garments stained crimson?

2 Who is this in glorious apparel, ♦ marching in the greatness of his strength?

May Christ, who bore our sins on the cross, set us free to serve him with joy. **Amen.**
